

**2nd Lt. Julius K. Yaretsky, Co. A, 33rd AL Infantry, CSA**

- 1839 Julius Yaretsky was born in Eastern Europe somewhere in modern day Poland or Russia.
- 1860 Jul 13: The US Federal Census enumerated in Coffee County, AL listed Julius Yaretsky as a twenty two year old man employed as a merchant. He was residing in a hotel owned by Newsom Taunton and his family. Julius's older brother/father Hyman was listed just before him as a merchant as well.
- 1862 Feb 11: Julius enlisted in the Confederate Army in the town of Elba, Coffee County, AL.  
 Mar 11: Julius was mustered into Co. A, 33rd AL Infantry, CSA as a private.
- 1863 Jan & Feb: Julius appeared on a muster roll as present. He was 2nd Sergeant in Co. A, 33rd AL at this point.  
 Jul & Aug: Julius Yaretsky appeared on a company muster roll as present. He had been promoted to 1st Sergeant by this time.  
 Nov & Dec: Julius appeared on a company muster roll as absent. Remarks: "Furloughed under Gen'l Orders to 182"
- 1864 Mar 10: 2nd Lt. Julius Yaretsky was issued one coat and one pair of pants.

Nov 30: 33rd AL Infantry engaged at the Battle of Franklin as part of Gen. Mark Lowrey's brigade of Gen. Cleburne's division. As Cleburne's men attacked, they met an advance line of Federal troops posted on a small hill in front of the main defensive line. They attacked this line with bayonets fixed in concert with Gen. Brown's division on the other side of the Columbia Pike. The Federal defenders broke and ran for safety in the main line of defenses, but as they were being chased in, they were in the way of their comrades trying to fire and repel the Confederate attackers. The Confederate troops like Lt. Yaretsky stormed into the works behind their foes but soon found themselves pinned down and exhausted. Lt. Julius Yaretsky was captured during this action and was taken north to Nashville as a prisoner of war.

Dec 2: Julius Yaretsky appeared on a list of prisoners of war at Nashville, TN. The record states that Yaretsky was moved north to Louisville, KY.

Dec 3: Yaretsky appeared on a roll of prisoners of war transported from Louisville, KY to Johnson's Island, OH.

Dec 5: Lt. Yaretsky appeared on a roll of prisoners of war taken at a prisoner depot near Sandusky, OH. Remarks: "Released on amnesty oath May 13, 1865"

- 1865 May 13: Julius Yaretsky's signed the oath of allegiance at Johnson's Island, OH.

- 1870 Jun 9: The US Federal Census enumerated in Lauderdale County, MS listed Julius Yaretsky at thirty years old employed as a dry goods merchant. He was the head of the household and lived with his wife Dora and two children. A woman named Peggy Rilla was employed as a domestic servant. Another woman named Carrie Archer was employed as a clerk in his dry goods store. The household preceding Julius' is his brother Mark and their father Hyman.
- 1878 Jun 19: Julius Yaretsky appointed as a postmaster in Noxubee County, MS. He took over the duty from his father Hyman.
- 1881 A register of post offices and postmasters recorded Julius Yaretsky as the postmaster of the Shuqualak in Noxubee County, MS.
- 1900 June 6: The US Federal Census enumerated in Noxubee County, MS showed Julius Yaretsky at fifty two years old employed as a barber. His daughter Carrie and son Marcus

lived with him. This census recorded Julius' immigration date as 1860. He was listed as a naturalized citizen.

1910 Apr 20: The US Federal Census enumerated in Noxubee County, MS listed Julius Yaretzky as a widower at sixty four years old employed as a fur trader. His two daughters Carrie and Beulah lived with him as well as a nine year old boarder named Tom Hudson.

1920-1924 Passport applications submitted by Julius' son Richard indicate that Julius died. He was buried in the Beth Israel Cemetery in Meridian, MS.
