

Abraham T. Hougland, Captain, Co. I, 175 OH Infantry, US

- 1830 Born to Samuel and Elizabeth McClure Hougland in Ohio.
- 1840 The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Summit County, OH showed Samuel as head of household, nine total free whites lived in the household, Abraham was the male under five.
- 1850 September 9: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Summit County, OH showed nineteen year old Abraham lived with his parents and five siblings. His occupation was listed as a farmer.
- 1851 November 19: Married Adaline Derthick in Summit County, OH.
- 1864 October 8: Koontz had previous Civil War experience when he joined the 175 OH.
 His pension records indicate he served in the 14th MO Infantry, as well as the 66th IL Infantry. He was a seasoned soldier by the time he mustered into the newly formed 175 OH Infantry.



November 30: Fought at the Battle of Franklin.

- 1865 June 27: Mustered out of the U.S. Army.
- 1870 August 12: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Polk County, IA showed Abraham lived with his wife and four children. Occupation listed as carpenter.
- 1880 June 1: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Summit County, OH showed Abraham lived with his wife and four children. No occupation was listed. F.C Hudson, a book agent, also lived with the family as a boarder.


Throughout the rest of his life Hougland was active in the Temperance Movement.



1883 September 19: Applied for and received a military pension for his service in the Civil War.
