

Adam Humberger, Private, Co. C, 30 IN Infantry, US

1832 July: Born to Peter and Elizabeth Wiseman Humberger in Perry County, Ohio.

1850 November 1: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Perry County, OH showed Adam lived with his parents and siblings. He and his father's occupation was listed as Gunsmith.

1860 June 15: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Licking County, OH showed Adam lived with his brother, Samuel, and his family. His occupation was listed as Gunsmith.

November 26: Married Mary Ann Fisher in Indiana.

1864 September 29: Drafted in Co. C 30 IN as a private in Kendallville, IN.

November 30: Wounded at the Battle of Franklin, TN. Severe wound in left foot; amputated

1865 April 27: Discharged for Disability

1870 August 11: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Marshall County, IN showed Adam lived with his wife and three children. His occupation was listed as a farmer.

1880 May 18: Adam committed suicide in Plymouth, IN while in jail for being insane. He was buried in Tippecanoe Cemetery.

HUNG HIMSELF IN JAIL.
PLYMOUTH, May 18.—Adam Humberger, a resident of Tippecanoe Town, was found dead in the cell of the jail this morning at this place. He was yesterday adjudged insane, and was to have been taken to the Indianapolis Asylum to-day. He tore up his bedclothing, made a rope, and hanged himself. The deceased was a farmer, aged forty-seven, and leaves a wife and family in good circumstances. His insanity was caused by religious subjects.
