

**Pvt. Angus Malcom Canterbury Carmichael, Co. D, 7th Battalion MS Infantry, CSA**

1822 Angus Malcom Canterbury Carmichael was born in South Carolina to parents Archibald and Katherine Carmichael.

1850 Aug 26: The US Federal Census enumerated in Clarke County, MS listed Angus Carmichael as a twenty eight year old farmer with one hundred dollars in real estate. He was the head of the household and lived with his wife, Sarah, two children, and a thirty year old male farmer named John Douglass.

1860 Apr 2: The US General Land Office recorded that Angus M C Carmichael purchased 152.04 acres of land in Clarke County, MS.

Jul 31: The US Federal Census enumerated in Marion County, SC listed A M Carmichael as a thirty eight year old farmer with \$3000 in real estate and \$2,500 in his personal estate. He was the head of the household and lived with his wife and several children.

1861 May 26: Angus M C Carmichael enlisted in the 13th MS Infantry at Union City, TN. He was mustered into Company G as a private. They were transferred to Virginia.

1862 Mar 7: Angus's younger brothers, Malcolm and Michael Carmichael, enlisted in the 7th Battalion MS Infantry as privates.

Jul: Angus M. C. Carmichael discharged from the 13th MS Infantry at Richmond, VA.

1863 Oct 12: Angus M. C. Carmichael enlisted in the 7th Battalion MS Infantry at Enterprise, MS. He was mustered into Co. D as a private shortly after.

1864 Nov 30: Pvt. Angus Carmichael fought at the Battle of Franklin as part of the 7th Battalion MS Infantry. This battalion was part of Gen. Sears Brigade, French's Division, Stewart's Corps. They attacked the Federal defenses just to the east of the Carter Cotton Gin and paid dearly for the attempt. Pvt. Carmichael was severely wounded in the left leg and left in Franklin for treatment.

Dec 1: Pvt. Angus Carmichael received an amputation of his left leg in Franklin, TN.

Dec 26: Pvt. Angus Carmichael was admitted to General Hospital No. 1 in Nashville, TN for treatment of his injuries. "Operation: Antero posterior flap amputation upper third left leg"

1865 Mar 1: Pvt. Angus Carmichael died in Nashville, TN due to injuries sustained in the Battle of Franklin. He was buried in the Confederate circle at the Mount Olivet Cemetery in Nashville, TN.
