Francis Marion Crutchfield, Private, Co. H, 2 TN Cavalry, CSA

- 1845 (btwn Aug-Dec) Francis Marion Crutchfield was born to John and Minerva Crutchfield in Henry County, TN.
- 1850 December 9: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Henry County, TN showed 5-year-old Francis living with his parents and siblings. His father, John, was a farmer.
- 1860 August 2: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Weakley County, TN showed 14-year-old "Marion" living with his parents and siblings. His father was listed as a farmer.
- July 15: Crutchfield's father, John, enlisted in the U.S. Army in Dresden, TN. He mustered into 6th TN Cavalry.

August 10: Crutchfield's older brothers, William and Jasper, enlisted in the U.S. Army in Dresden, TN. They mustered into the 6 U.S. Cavalry. Both of his brothers had deserted by February of 1863. Their records were identical of their desertion, from Crockett Station, TN on "Feb 27." John Crutchfield was in the army till the end of the war, however he spent a good deal of his time in a hospital in Memphis at the end of the war. He was not present during Hood's Tennessee Campaign. He was still sick in a hospital in Nashville in June of 1865. By 1870 John had died, it is entirely likely that he died in a military hospital.


1864 April 1: Enlisted in the C.S. Cavalry in Mt. Pelia, TN. He mustered into Co. H, 2nd TN Cavalry. Francis was only eighteen years old.

Service Record of 2nd/22nd Regiment, Tennessee Cavalry (Barteau's)

22nd (Barteau's) Cavalry Regiment, originally and often called 2nd Regiment, was organized in June, 1862, by consolidating the 1st and 7th Tennessee Cavalry Regiments. It was assigned to Ferguson's and T.H. Bell's Brigade and for the most part served in Northern Mississippi. The unit was active at Iuka, Corinth, Brice's Cross Roads, Fort Pillow, and Harrisburg. Later it moved with Hood back to Tennessee and in February, 1865, was consolidated with Wilson's 21st Cavalry Regiment. This command totalled 31 officers and 317 men in May and surrendered with the Department of Alabama, Mississippi, and East

Louisiana. The field officers were Colonel Clark R. Barteau, Lieutenant Colonel George H. Morton, and Majors O.B. Farris and William Parrish.²




May & June: Company Muster Roll. Present.

November 30: Fought at the Battle of Franklin.

December 17: Captured by the U.S. Army near Franklin, TN and sent to

June 12: Died of chronic diarrhea at Camp Douglas, IL. He was buried in Grave #2113 of the Prisoner of War Grave Yard.
