

## Eugene Wiegand, 2nd Lieutenant, Co. E, 75 PA Infantry, U.S.A.

- 1839 January: Wiegand was born in Prussia (what is today Germany).
- 1860 September 25: According to Naturalization Records, Wiegand officially became a naturalized citizen of the United States. He had arrived only earlier that year to Philadelphia, PA.
- 1861 September 2: Enlisted in the U.S. Army. Wiegand was originally in Co. B, 75 PA Infantry. His point of origin was Philadelphia, PA.
- 1862 May 2: Muster Roll. Wiegand was promoted to 2nd Lieutenant, and moved to Co. E.
- 1864 May: According to returns at Military Posts, Wiegand was at "Head Quarters". Marked Present.
- November 30: Wiegand was captured at the Battle of Franklin. He was sent to Andersonville Prison, GA.
- 1865 April 1: Wiegand was released from Andersonville Prison, GA via prisoner exchange.
- 1867 According to voter registries, Wiegand moved to 228 Post Street, San Francisco, CA. He worked as a clerk.
- (abt) Wiegand married Caroline C. Abele.
- 1870 July 9: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in San Francisco County, CA showed Wiegand worked as a clerk and lived with his wife and a domestic servant named Ann McDermott.
- 1880 June 2: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in San Francisco County, CA showed Wiegand living with his wife and son, Eugene Arthur Wiegand. They lived at 1910 Mason Street.
- 1886 August 25: According to voter registries, Wiegand again moved. While still in San Francisco, CA, he now lived at 1115 Clay Street.
- 1898 June 10: According to voter registries, Wiegand again moved. While still in San Francisco, CA, he now lived at 806 Webster Street.
- 1900 June 4: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in San Francisco County, CA showed Wiegand lived with his wife.

The exact date of Wiegand's death is unknown. Records for him seem to cease after this point.

1901 Wiegand is buried at the Veterans' Memorial Grove Cemetery, in Yountville, Napa County, CA. He's in Section A, Row 9, Grave 6.



November 25: Wiegand's widow Caroline filed and received a Widow's Pension. It can be inferred that Wiegand passed at some point during this year.
