

Fielding Pope Sloan, Asst. Surgeon, Co. B, 50 AL Regiment, C.S.A.

- 1833 April 7: Sloan was born in Polk County, TN to James and Susan Sloan.
- 1850 October 12: The U.S. Census enumerated in Polk County, Tennessee showed that Sloan lived and worked on his father's farm along with his mother, siblings (Felix, Robert, Mary, James, William, Flavel, and Thomas), as well as the young Fry Family.

At some point Sloan received his medical degree and moved to Murray County, GA.

- 1860 June 15: The U.S. Census enumerated in Murray County, GA showed that Sloan worked as a physician while he lived with the Randle Family, and a man named A.F. Lowrey.
- 1861 July 3: Enlisted in the Confederate Army. Company Muster Roll. Denoted Atlanta, GA as Sloan's place of origin. He mustered in as a part of the 11 GA Infantry.

August 31: Company Muster Roll. Denoted Sloan as Absent. Remarked "Discharged at Camp Bartow, Va. [today located in West Virginia] on Surgeon's Certificate of Disability."

1862 February 14: Re-Enlisted in the Confederate Army. Company Muster Roll. Denoted Cleveland, TN as Sloan's place of origin. He mustered in as part of the 5 TN Cavalry.

March 1: Company Muster Roll. Denoted Sloan as Present. Remarked "Elected 2nd Lt.".

May - June: Company Muster Roll. Denoted Sloan as Present.

1863 June 10: Sloan appeared on a Register of Appointments. He was appointed to the position of Assistant Surgeon.

July: Sloan appeared on a Roll of non-commissioned officers employed on extra duty. He signed this roll as the surgeon in charge of the Clinch Hospital in Kingston, TN.

1864 April 30: Company Muster Roll. Denoted Sloan as Present. He was assigned to the 50 Alabama Regiment as Asst. Surgeon.

August 15: Sloan appeared on a Report of Staff of S.D. Lee's Corps. This showed Sloan was present at the Battle of Atlanta, GA.

November 30: Sloan participated in the Battle of Franklin. His litter bearers were all down so proceeded onto the field to tend to wounded soldiers. He was wounded in his left wrist and right lung, and left at a hospital (supposedly the Harris-McEwen House) in Franklin, TN.

1865 June 19: Sloan died of his wounds at Franklin, at the age of 32. He was buried in the Rest Haven Cemetery, Franklin, Williamson County, TN.
