- 1845 September 14: Herman Hilbert was born in Indiana to German immigrant parents John and Adelaide Fisher Hilbert.
- 1850 November 14: The US Federal Census enumerated Highland, Franklin County, IN showed four-year-old Herman living with his parents and siblings. His father was a farmer.
- 1860 June 5: The US Federal Census enumerated in Highland, Franklin, IN showed fourteen-year-old Herman living with his parents and siblings. His father was a farmer and Herman was listed as being a farm hand.
- October 13: At the age of nineteen, Hilbert enlisted in the U.S. Army as a substitute for Michael Gies. Hilbert mustered into Co. B, 35 IN Infantry.
 - November 30: In the army barely a month and Hilbert fought at the Battle of Franklin. He fought on the Western flank of the U.S. line in Kimball's division.
- 1865 September 30: Mustered out of the U.S. Army.
- 1867 October 8: Married Mary Charlotte Strasburger in Dearborn County, IN.
- 1870 July 15: The US Federal Census enumerated in Highland, Franklin County, IN showed Herman, a farmer, and Charlotte living with their infant daughter, Katy. The young couple was living on a neighboring farm to his parents.
- 1880 June 26: The US Federal Census enumerated in Highland, Franklin County, IN showed Herman, a farmer, and Charlotte living with their daughter Katy. They are again living next to Herman's parents.

- 1888 August 18: Hilbert applied for and was granted a pension for his military service.
- 1900 June 19: The US Federal Census enumerated in Highland, Franklin County, IN showed Herman, a farm laborer, and Charlotte living with their daughter and her family.
- 1902 April 7: Katy, Herman and Charlotte's only child to grow to maturity died in Highland Center, IN. She was only 32 years old.
- April 30: The US Federal Census enumerated in Highland, Franklin County, In showed Herman, a farmer and Charlotte living with their three year old granddaughter. Charlotte was listed as having given birth to three children, with no children currently surviving.


