Chauncey C. Hulet, Private, Co. A, 40 IN Infantry, US

- 1841 November 25: Born in Medina County, OH to John and Minerva Hulet.
- 1850 September 5: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in York, Medina, OH showed eight-year-old Chauncey living with his parents and siblings. His father, John, was a chair maker.¹


(abt. 1850) Hulet's father, John, died.

- 1860 June 21: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Laramie, Tippecanoe, IN showed Chauncey and his older sister Orra living in the house of a minister, Aaron Guernsey, and his family. Orra was listed as a school teacher and Chauncey as a day laborer.
- 1861 September 7: Hulet enlisted in the U.S. Army and mustered into Co. A 40th IN Infantry.
- 1863(64) May 18: Hulet's mother Minerva died in Cuyahoga County, OH.
- 1864 November 30: Hulet fought at the Battle of Franklin. His regiment was in Lane's Brigade, Wagner's division.
- 1865 July 11: Hulet mustered out of the U.S. Army.
- 1867 June 6: Hulet married Sarah J. Hunt in Cuyahoga County, OH.
- 1868 Hulet was listed on Cuyahoga County, OH tax lists for 1868.
- 1870 July 18: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Berea Village, Cuyahoga, OH showed Chauncey, a carpenter, and Sarah living with their infant son Earnest. Also living with the couple was Chauncey's brother Perry.
- 1880 June 10: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Berea, Cuyahoga, OH showed Chauncey, a carpenter, and Sarah J., living with their son Earnest.
- 1890 The U.S. Federal Census Veterans Schedule enumerated in Berea, Cuyahoga County, OH listed Chauncey Hulet as a veteran of Co. A, 40 IN Infantry. He

served from 1861 to 1865. He was still suffering from effects from a gunshot wound to the wrist.

- 1900 June 13: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Rush, Scioto, OH showed Chauncey, a carpenter, living with his wife Sarah.
- 1910 May 3: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Rush, Scioto, OH showed Chauncey, a house carpenter, living with his wife Sarah.
- 1918 July 22: Hulet's wife Sarah died.
- 1919 February 24: Hulet applied for a passport in order to travel to Cuba "for pleasure." His trip was planned for March 6th.
- 1920 Eighty-year-old Hulet married widow Almira King Stolp.
- 1925 August 21: Second wife Almira died in Pinellas County, FL.
- 1930 April 11: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in St. Petersburg, Pinellas, FL showed a widowed Chauncey, retired, living on his own.

1935 Hulet was enumerated on the Florida State Census living in Pinellas County. He was listed as "retired" and "widowed." According to Tallahassee Democrat Hulet was the oldest member of a baseball team called the "three quarter century ball club."³


