- 1868 February 20: Married Sarah E. Moreland in North Liberty, Johnson County, IA.
- 1870 June 4: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Penn, Johnson County, IA showed Isaac, a farmer, and Sarah living with their infant daughter, Mary.
- 1880 June 1: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Penn, Johnson County, IA showed Isaac, a farmer, and Sarah living with their children.
- 1900 June 2: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Penn, Johnson County, IA showed Isaac, a farmer and Sarah living with six of their children.
- 1903 September: Isaac was chosen as a delegate by his local GAR chapter to attend the National Encampment in San Francisco.¹

# Isaac Meyers Is One Of North Liberty's Last Boys In Blue

NORTH LIBERTY, May 26.—
When the people of North Liberty and surrounding country meet at the cemetery Sunday afternoon to pay tribute to their war dead one of the honored persons present will be Isaac Meyers, who will be 81 years old next September. He with his parents, two brothers and two sisters, came to Iowa from Pennsylvania in 1849, coming all of the way except thirteen miles by boat on canal and rivers. The father contracted cholera on board boat, was removed at Muscatine (then Bloomington) where he died in a few hours. The widow came to Penn township but after a few months she returned with her children to their old home in Pennsylvania.

Isaac Meyers returned to Iowa when 18 years old, in 1859. He is among the oldest alumni of Cornell college at Mount Vernon. He left school to serve with the Union army, enlisting at Iowa City Aug. 19, 1861, in Company H, Second Iowa cavalry. He took part in numerous battles. During a fierce engagement tles. During a fierce engagement at Franklin, Tenn., he was shot through the left thigh and was confined to a hospital for four and a half months. He was mustered out at Selma, Ala. Sept. 22, 1865, and re-turned home in ill health, being unable to work for nearly a year. He is a member of the G. A. R. and has never missed a reunion of his old company. He has been a member of the Masonic lodge for forty-six years. All but a few of these years he has served the lodge as treasurer. He is a member of Samuel J. Kirkwood Post, G. A. R. of Iowa City and he with Sergt. J. F. Ramsey, who is commander of that post, are the only remaining veterans in Penn township.

## North Liberty Civil War Veteran To Be Honored On Birthday

### Isaac Meyers, 96, War Veteran, Dies At North Liberty

NORTH LIBERTY — Is a a c Meyers, 96, the oldest resident of North Liberty and the last Civil war veteran here, died Wednesday evening of pneumonia at the home of his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Lentz.

Mr. Meyers was born in York county, Pennsylvania, Sept. 26, 1841, and when 18 years old came to Iowa on a second trip. He attended Cornell college at Mount Vernon, which he left to join the Union army, but was regarded as an alumnus of the institution, being one of its first students.

Enlisting in Company H, Second Iowa cavalry, under Major H. W. Love in Iowa City, he served throughout the Civil war, during which he was wounded. With the

closing of the war he was mustered out at Selma, Ala..

After the war he located on his grandfather's farm which had been obtained from the government. In 1868 he was married to Sarah E. Moreland and they made their home on the farm for many years, rearing a family of seven children who were educated in the local and Iowa City schools.

Mr. Meyers was an honored member of the Masonic fraternity which he joined 56 years ago, of White Marble lodge No. 238 of North Liberty and Chapter 2 of Iowa City.

Mrs. Meyers died in 1920. Surviving children are Mrs. Anna Albertson of Whittier, Calif., Mrs. Iowa Lentz of North Liberty, John G. Meyers of Gasport, N. Y., I. B. Meyers of North Liberty, Lewis Meyers of Colorado Springs. There are 22 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 2 p.m. at the Methodist church in North Liberty with the Rev. J. A. Worrell in charge. Burial will be in Ridgewood cemetery, near North Liberty.

#### Girl Injured While Riding In Car With State Agent Is Dead

FORT DODGE (AP) — Miss Alma Schoepke of Pocahontas died in a local hospital Thursday from injuries received in an automobile collision near Rockwell City, March 10.
