



Isaiah Larkin, 1 Lieutenant, Co. I, 175 OH Infantry, US

- 1835 February 10: Born to John and Ester Whitsell Larkin in Ohio.
- 1850 The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Seneca County, OH showed Isaiah lived with his mother and siblings.
- 1860 The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Hardin County, OH showed Isaiah lived in a hotel owned by his brother John Larkin. His occupation is listed as a grocery keeper.
- 1861 June 4: Enlisted into Co. G, 4th OH Infantry.
- 1862 October 31: Mustered out of the U.S. Army. Discharged Disability
- 1863 September 3: Married Leonora Miller in Hardin County, OH.
- 1864 October 11: Mustered into Co. I, 175 OH at Camp Dennison, OH.
- November 30: Fought at the Battle of Franklin, TN.
- 1865 June 27: Mustered out of the U.S. Army in Nashville, TN.
- 1870 June 20: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Hardin County, OH showed Isaiah lived with his wife and children. His occupation was listed as cabinet maker.

- 1880 June 1: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Hardin County, OH showed Isaiah lived with his wife and children. His occupation was listed as worked in a wagon shop.
- 1885 March 1: Kansas State Census enumerated in McPherson County, KS showed Isaiah lived with his wife and children as a carpenter.
- 1890 City Directory taken in Denver, CO. Isaiah lived as a carpenter with his wife.
- 1900 June 7: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Teller County, CO showed Isaiah lived with his wife and children. His occupation was listed as house carpenter.
- 1903 November 9: Died in Denver County, CO is buried in Riverside Cemetery in Denver.

### Isaiah Larkins Dead

Isaiah Larkins, aged 68 years, died at his home in Denver, November 9, 1903. The services were held at the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. B. Waltermire, under the auspices of the G. A. R., the chaplin of the Post conducting the impressive services.

He enlisted at the first call for volunteers in the Civil War, and was made 1st Lieut. of Co. H, 4th Ohio Infantry, where he served honorably, being mustered out at the close of the war. It was indeed fitting that so honorable a soldier should be laid to rest wearing the blue, and the stars and stripes draped on his casket.

Mr. Larkins was well and favorably known in McPherson, he and his family having resided here for a number of years previous to their moving to Colorado. He was the contractor and builder of the First National bank block which was destroyed by fire in July, 1898, and of the Union block and many of the handsome and substantial residences of McPherson. His many old friends will be grieved to learn of his death.
