Mallie Otey Johnson 1857-1925 Enslaved at Carnton

- 1857 May 24: Mallie Otey was born to enslaved parents Mariah McGavock and Harvey Otey at Carnton. Mallie was born a fraternal twin. Her twin brother was Frank.
- 1860 The U.S. Federal Census did not enumerate enslaved people by name. There was a "Slave Schedule," which listed the name of the slave owner and the gender, age and race of each enslaved person, but no names. It is believed that Mariah McGavock was enumerated as a twenty-six year old female living in a household with several children, among those five year old twins one male and one female Frank and **Mallie**.,
- 1862-1863 During the U.S. occupation of Franklin, the enslaved people owned by the McGavock family were sent south. Mallie's mother Mariah, was in Alabama. Mallie's exact location is unknown at this time. Later documentation leads us to believe that Mallie was not raised by her mother, but by Fanny McGavock Southall.¹
- 1863 March 23: Harvey Otey, Mallie's father, died. He was buried in a marked grave at the city cemetery in Franklin.
- 1875 October 19: Mallie Otey married Charles Ebenezer Johnson in Williamson County, TN.
- 1878 (abt) Mallie gave birth to son William B. Johnson.William was a veteran of the U.S. Army and died in Kansas.
- 1879 September 27: Mallie gave birth to son Charles Ebenezer "Pickett" Johnson. Charles Jr., nicknamed Pickett, moved to Canada to work for the Grand Trunk Railway. He was a sleeping car porter, which wasn't a glamorous job, but steady.²
- 1880 June 19: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in District 9, Williamson County, TN showed Mallie, 23, and her husband Charles, 27-year-old sawyer, and their two young children: Willie, 2 and Charles, 8 months. Also boarding in the

Johnson household was a minister by the name of James Picket and Charles' grandmother Patsy Merrill. Fannie Southall, another former slave at Carnton, and her family were living within a couple households of the Johnsons. Mallie remained close to Fannie and her children.

- 1882 February: Mallie gave birth to daughter Mattie B Johnson. Mattie B. Johnson grew up to be a beloved teacher. Her parents lived with Mattie at the end of their lives.
- 1883 December 24: On Christmas Eve, Fannie McGavock Southall, Mallie's neighbor and the woman who helped to raise her died.
- 1889 August 8: Mallie gave birth to son Samuel Benjamin Johnson. Samuel moved to Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada with his brother Pickett and also worked for the Grand Trunk Railway.
- 1895 November 19: Mallie gave birth to son Frank Watt Johnson.
- 1896 August 3: Mallie gave birth to daughter Louise Johnson. Louise married William Morrissey and lived all over the U.S., from Virginia, to St. Louis to California.
- 1900 June 9: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Franklin, Williamson County, TN showed Ebenezer, a laborer, and Mallie living with only their eighteen-year-old daughter Mattie. Mattie was attending school at the time. All the family members could read and write and Ebb and Mallie owned their own home free from mortgage.
- 1909 The Nashville Globe reported: "Mrs Ebenezer Johnson, of East Hill street, Nashville, is out the guest of her mother-in-law, Mrs. Laura Evans, of Columbia ave....and was the guest of breakfast Sunday morning at Mrs. A.N.C. Williams."³
- 1910 April 18: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Nashville, Davidson County, TN showed C.E., an engineer at a laundry, and Mallie living at 38 South Hill with their children: Mattie B, 26, (a teacher), Frank, 17, Louise, 14 and Will, 30(a chauffeur). Mallie was enumerated as having given birth to nine children and six were currently living. Ebb and Mallie were renting their home.

- Ebenezer and Mallie Otey were listed in the Nashville City Directory living at 25
 Wharf St. Their House was in close proximity to both Walden University and
 Meharry Medical College.⁴
- 1915 Chas. E and Mallie Otey were listed in the Nashville City Directory living at 25 Wharf St.
- 1918 Ebenezer and Mallie Otey were listed in the Nashville City Directory still residing at 25 Wharf St.

November 21: An article about Mallie and Ebb's son Pickett was in the Nashville Globe, it mentions Mallie and Ebb and where they lived.

Mrs. Johnson was much admired and won many friends by her charming personality. After a stay of seven weeks with relatives and friends here and in Franklin, who regretted very much to see them leave, Mr and Mrs. Johnson returned to their home accompained by their sister. Miss Louise Johnson, one of our city teachers, who goes to find a much needed rest in Winnipeg and other cities of the north.



1922 December 21: Mallie's mother, Mariah McGavock Otey Reddick died. When Mariah died she left her house and land to her son John Watt Reddick and the rest of her property went to her daughter Mallie and her granddaughter Bessie.

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1924 Ebenezer and Mallie Otey were listed in the Nashville City Directory residing at 26 Shepherd St.

1925 May 21: Three days before her birthday, Mallie Otey Johnson died at her home in Nashville. She was buried at Toussaint L'Ouverture, her grave site is unknown.
