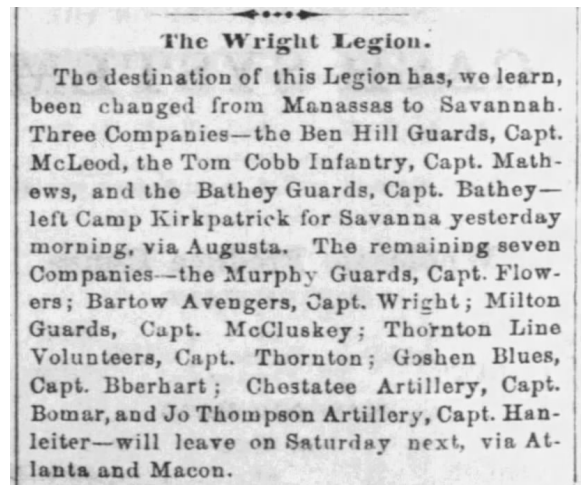


Isaac V. Moore, Sargeant, Co. E, 37 GA Infantry, CSA

- 1830 November 17: Born to John and Martha Vaughn Moore in Elbert County, GA.
- 1850 August 7: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Elbert, Elbert County, GA showed nineteen-year-old I.V., living with his parents and siblings. Isaac, his father and two of his brothers were listed as “farmers.”
- 1852 October 18: Moore married Elizabeth J. Simmons in Madison County, GA.
- 1860 January 28: The U.S. Census enumerated in Danielsville, Madison County, GA showed Isaac V. Moore, Clerk, and Elizabeth living with their four children, all under the age of six!
- 1861 October 15: Brothers William and Thomas enlisted in the CS Army and mustered into Co. B, 38th GA Infantry.



- 1862 May 10: Enlisted in the CS Army in Danielsville, GA. He mustered into Co. B, 9th Battallion GA Infantry.

November & December: Company Muster Roll. Present.

December 13: Brother, Thomas, wounded at Fredericksburg, VA.

1863 May: Regiment consolidated.

*This regiment was formed in May, 1863, by the consolidation of the 9th Battalion Georgia Infantry (also known as the 17th Battalion Georgia Infantry) with companies B, C, E, F and H of the 3d Battalion Georgia Infantry.

September 18: *We marched to Chicamauga[sic] Creek. Heavy firing commence, the enemy shelled us heavy.*

September 19: *This is the day of the great battle. Our Brigade got into the battle about 3 o'clock, killed and wounded in our Regiment about 140, three in Company E. They were Lieut. Power, Corporal Morris and R. T. Power, 93 wounded. Myself wounded in the right side. Ball struck cap box, did not go through. W.A.J. Brown (Jesse Brown 's grandfather) carried me off the battle ground. (He had a sick certificate) and he followed us and carried me behind a log to protect us from bullets.*

September 20: *Still fighting.*

September 21: *I came to the railroad at Dalton on my way to Hospital.*

September 22-27: *Got to Atlanta on 22nd, 26th and left for home night of 23rd and got on the 24th 1863. Stayed at home till October 27th, 1863.*

1864 February 8: Reenlisted for the length of the war.⁴

April: Company Muster Roll. Present.

November 7: *Got word of the death of my son I.D. Moore.*
Isaac David Moore was only four years old.

November 17: *Birthday today, 34 years old.*

November 24: *Marched into Lawrence County and camped. November 25th*

November 25: *Marched past Henryville.*

November 26: *We marched past Mount Pleasant in Murry[sic] County to Columbia.*

November 27: We surrounded Columbia.

November 28: *The Yankees slipped out and left Columbia.*

November 29: *We marched across Duck River to Spring Hill.*

November 30: *We marched to Franklin in William. County, where a great battle was fought. It commenced at 5 in the evening and lasted all night. The Yankees gave up and left after the turn of the night. It was a bad time, our loss 423 killed. The Yankees lost was 313 killed on the field.*

December 1: *We buried the dead today. We buried the Yankees in their own ditches.*

December 2: *I went with the Guard and Lieut. to Columbia with prisoners, and it took most all night to get there.*

December 3: *Returned to Spring Hill.*

December 4: *Marched near Nashville.*

December 5: *Battle at creek near Murfreesboro.*

December 6: *We built breastworks on the old battlefield.*

December 7: *Moved to the right. A considerable battle on the old battle field. Sargt. Griffeth and B. A. Moon were killed and left in the hands of the enemy. We marched back to the Nashville Pike road.*

December 8: *Destroyed the Railroad.*

December 9: *Marched to the spring.*

December 10-11: *Marched above Lebanon near Nashville.*

December 12: *Marched to the line of battle.*

December 13: *Some skirmishing today.*

December 14: *Heavy fighting today on the left. We moved to the left.*

December 16: *Heavy fighting today, and we retreated to Franklin, from Nashville. W. F. Strickland was killed here. This is the roughest time we have had.*

December 17-19: *Moved to Spring Hill, then to the creek and to Columbia.*

December 20: *Marched to Linville, then on to Pulaski, then reached Tennessee River on 25th.*

December 26-28: *Crossed the Tennessee River, marched to near Tuscumbia, Ala., remained here through the 28th.⁵*

1865 May 1: Moore was listed on a Muster Roll of paroled prisoners of the United States Army. He was paroled at Greensboro, N.C..

1867 July 16: Moore signed an oath to uphold the Constitution of the United States to regain his voting rights as a citizen of the United States of America.

"I, Isaac V. Moore do solemnly swear

in the presence of Almighty God, that I am a citizen of the State of Georgia; that I have resided in said State for 12 months

next preceeding this day, and now reside in the County of Madison in said State; that I

am 21 years old; that I have not been disfranchised for participation in any rebellion or civil war against the United States, nor for felony

committed against the laws of any State or the United States; that I have never been a member of any State Legislature, nor held any

executive or judicial office in any State, and afterwards engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or given aid or comfort

to the enemies thereof; that I have never taken an oath as a member of Congress of the United States, or as an officer of the United States,

or as a member of any State Legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States,

and afterwards engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or given aid and comfort to the enemies thereof; that I will

faithfully support the Constitution and obey the laws of the United States, and will to the best of my ability, encourage others so to do.

So help me, God."

The said Isaac V. Moore further swears

that he has not been previously registered under the provisions of "An Act supplementary to 'an act to provide for

the more efficient government of the rebel States'—passed March 2, 1867—and to facilitate restoration," under this

1870 August 15: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Danielsville, Madison County, GA showed, Isaac V., a farmer, and Elizabeth living with six children between the ages of 2-19.

1880 June 7: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Newtown, Madison County, GA showed Isaac V., a farmer, and Elizabeth living with six of their children between the ages of 24 and 1.

The Agriculture Schedule of the U.S. Census enumerated on the same day listed the production of Moore's farm.

Moore owned 141 acres of land, with 77 acres being improved. He hired one laborer for one week and paid him \$5.00. His livestock consisted of 5 milch cows, 3 other cattle, 5 sheep, 11 pigs and 25 chickens. Production consisted of 150 lbs of butter, 2 pounds wool, 100 bushels of indian corn, 100 bushels of oats and 85 bushels of wheat.

1887 January 27: Moore's father John N. Moore died and Isaac was appointed exector of his father's estate.

- 1896 Several issues of The Danielsville Monitor of Madison County listed "Isaac V. Moore" as serving on a "Grand Jury" for the March term, and doing quick business.
- 1897 February 17: Elizabeth Simmons Moore died.
- 1900 June 1: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Fork, Madison County, GA showed a widowed Isaac, a farmer, living with two of his youngest children.
- 1902 (abt) Moore married second wife, Sarah Frances Almond Bentley. Fannie was a widow with eight grown children.
- 1910 April 16: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Fork, Madison County, GA showed Isaac, a farmer, living with his new wife Fannie. They are both in their 70's. Living with them is a young woman named Caroline Hector, listed as a servant.

1915 July 26: Moore applied for a State of Georgia Pension for his military service during the Civil War.

1. What is your name and where do you reside? (Give County and Post-office) *T. V. Moore, Carlton Sta. Madison County*
2. How long and since when have you been a continuous resident citizen of this State? *All my life, 85 years.*
3. Did you enlist in the Army of the Confederate States or of the Organized Militia of this State from 1861 to 1865? *Army of Confederate States*
4. When and where, and in what Company and Regiment did you enlist? (Give the arm and class of Service) *May, 1862, Danielsville, Ga. Co. M. C. 37 Ga. Reg. Infantry Sargent.*
5. How long did you remain in the actual Military Service with said Company and Regiment? (Give date of discharge) *From May, 1862 to April 27, 1865.*
6. When and where was your Company and Regiment surrendered or discharged from the Service? *April 27, 1865, Greensboro N.C.*
7. Were you actually present with your Command when it was surrendered or discharged? *Yes*
8. If you were not actually present, state specifically and clearly where you were... *X*

1918 November 29: Isaac Vaughn Moore died and was buried at Old Fork Cemetery in Madison County, GA.
