
Patrick Henry Manlove, Lieutenant, Co. B, 1 TN Infantry, CSA

- 1838 May 8: Patrick Henry Manlove was born to parents Joseph and Caroline Manlove in Nashville, TN.
- 1850 The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Davidson County, TN listed that twelve year old Patrick lived with his family. He attended school and his father was listed as a physician.
- 1860 The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Davidson County, TN showed twenty two year old Patrick lived with numerous other young men in Nashville under the roof of a dry goods merchant named George T. Thompson. These young men lived in what is listed as a "store" and they are all listed as salesmen, merchants, or bookkeepers. The vast majority were salesmen. The author believes that they were apprenticed to George T. Thompson and learned his trade.
- 1861 May 10: Patrick Henry Manlove enlisted in the Rock City Guards, part of which became Company B, 1st TN Infantry, for use in the Confederate defense of Tennessee from Federal forces.
- 1862 November & December: Listed as "Absent"

 Remarks: "Sick in Shelbyville"
- 1863 May 1: Promoted to 3rd Lieutenant



1864 Nov 30: Fought at the Battle of Franklin. Manlove was wounded in the right thigh. The 1st Tennessee Infantry fought under Brig. Gen. John C. Carter's command and penetrated a grove of locust trees southwest of the Carter House. They contacted the main defensive line and fought valiantly even after dark and their commander, John Carter, was mortally wounded.

Dec 17: Manlove captured in Franklin, TN by U.S. troops during Hood's retreat. He was sent to Nashville for treatment of his injury.

1865 Jan 4: Forwarded north to Louisville, KY.

Jan 5: Received in Louisville, KY.

Jan 9: Sent to Fort Delaware, DE.

Jan 16: Received at Fort Delaware, DE.

May 30: Released from Fort Delaware after signing the oath of allegiance. His appearance was listed as, "Complexion: Fair, Hair: Brown, Eyes: Gray, Height: 5 ft. 11 in."

One list of prisoner records stated, "Released on Oath Alleg. May 30, 1865 Order Gen'l Grant."

- 1866 Manlove formed a business partnership with two other men and they tried their hand at the carpet and curtain business.²
- 1870 Patrick married Anna Elizabeth Gaut in Nashville, TN.

The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Davidson County, TN listed 32 year old Patrick as a dry goods merchant and Annie as "keeping house".

Manlove and his partners dissolved their partnership and went their separate ways.³

- 1872 Manlove was appointed administrator for four orphans.⁴
- 1893 Manlove held meetings of the Protestant Orphan Asylum at his home.⁵
- 1900 The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Davidson County, TN listed sixty two year old Patrick Manlove employed as a merchant. He lived with his wife Anna and one son, Joseph.

1907 Sep 4: Patrick Henry Manlove died after a battle with cardiac problems in Nashville, TN. He was buried in Mount Olivet Cemetery.⁶
