The Late Major Philbrook.

A correspondent of the News, furnishes the following sketch of the life of the late Major Alvah Philbrook, of the 24th.

Alvah Philhrook, of the 24th. "The officer whose name heads this note, was killed at the battle of Franklin, while in command of a part of the 24th regiment Wiseconsin volunteers, on the 35th of November last. He was been at Ossipee, N. H., April 24th 1830; resided for several years at Roston, Mass., and came to Wisconsin in 1856; sines which time, until he sutered the service, he was employed as Foreman in one of the abops of the Milwarkee & Mississippi Railroad Company. When the 21th regiment Wisconsin volunteers was organized he was appointed Captain of Co. D, his coumusion bearing date August 21st, 1862, and lett the State for the front, with the regiment, on the 5th September, 1862. From that time to the date of his decease he was with his regiment, sharing its labors and its glories, except for a trief period. Early in January, 1864, he came home on recruiting service, and soon atter his arrival was detailed to serve as a member of a Court Martial at Madison. Having concluded his duties as a member of the Court Martial he returned to the field on the 23d of June, 1861

Court Martial at Madison. Having concluded his duties as a member of the Court Martial he returned to the field on the 23d of June, 1864 his regiment being then at Atlanta. Maj. Phill rook participated in the several batties of Perryville, Stone River, Chicksmauga, Mi sion Ridge, Atlanta, and finally in the battle of Franklin, where he sealed his derbtion to his country by yielding up his life in her cause. That he faithfully discharged all the duties of his position, is sufficiently attested by the fact that by general order his name was entered upon General Rosecrans roll of h nor, for gallant service in the field, and by the further fact that on the 8th of Jane, 1864, he was commissioned as Major of his regiment.

Maj. Philbrook was, at the time of his decease, and for coveral years had been a highly esteemed member of Wisconsin Lodge No. 13, F. & A. Masons.

The members of the Lodge in common with his bereared family feit a strong desire to recover his remains, that they might receive proper burial here, and as soon as the relei army had been driven back over the field of Franklin the proper officers of the Lodge applied to Capt. Edwin F. Townsend commanding ordnance depot at Nashrille, and Dancan McBonald, Eq. of this city, then at Nashrille, to take the necessary steps to accomplish this object. Both these pestilemen responded at once to the request made of the city.

of them. An expedition was immediately organized; consisting of Mr. McCrea of Capt. Townsend's office, and Lieutenant Coate, and Sergeant Toohey of the 24th regiment, who proceeded to the battle field at Frankin. They found the precise point where Mojor Philbrook fell, and assertained that a considerable number of the federal dead had been buried in a tranch some twenty feet distant. With these, beyond doub, the remains of Maj. Philbrook were nuried, if burial it can be called. It being found impossible to identify his 'remains, the grafefition, after doing what they could to give a more decent burial to all these deposited, returned to Nashville.
