


Thomas Busby, Private, Co. F, 19 SC Infantry, CS

1840 March: Born to Eda Busby.

1850 August 28: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Orangeburg District, SC showed eight year old Thomas lived with the Stone family.

1860 July 21: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Lexington County, SC showed Thomas, a day laborer, lived with Dolly Busby, also a day laborer.


1861 November 18:



Nineteenth Regiment South Carolina Volunteers,
Col. NELSON, now being raised for the war, and
nearly completed; now in South Carolina.

December 30: Enlisted in the C.S. Army and mustered into Co. F, 19 SC Infantry, SC, as a private at Camp Hampton.



The 19th South Carolina Regiment was organized in Columbia on Friday last, by the election of Wm. C. Morange, Colonel; Augustus Lythgoe, Lieut. Colonel, and Abram Jones, Major. Six of the companies are from Edgefield, three from Abbeville, one from Sumter.

1862 January thru December : Company Muster Rolls. Present.

1863 January thru April: Company Muster Rolls. Present.

July & August: Company Muster Roll. Absent. Remarks "At home in Edgefield District on furlough August 15, 1863."

September thru December: Company Muster Rolls. Present.

1864 January thru April: Company Rolls. Present.

November 30: Wounded at the Battle of Franklin, TN. Severe wound in left leg; Amputated. He was captured at a hospital in Franklin on December 17th.

December 26: Transferred to U.S.A. Gen'l Hosp No. 1 in Nashville. His diagnosis was "gunshot fracture of the left tibia."

- 1876 Married Malinda Ann Mack in South Carolina.
- 1877 September: Daughter Frances was born in South Carolina.
- 1880 June 12: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Orangeburg County, SC showed Thomas lived by himself even though he was listed as married. His occupation was listed as a farmer.
- 1900 June 22: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Lexington County, SC showed Thomas, a widow, who lived by himself. His daughter and wife are living together in another home. His wife is listed as a widow. His occupation was listed as a farmer with a disability.
- 1916 November 8: Thomas died in Lexington, South Carolina from Dropsy⁶ at the age of 81. He was buried in Gaston First Baptist Church Cemetery.
