

William S. Bracken, Sergeant, Co. B, 97 OH Infantry, US

- 1842 Born in Pennsylvania to Thomas and Maria Bracken.
- 1850 September 11: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Cecil Twshp., Washington County, PA showed eight year old William living with his parents and siblings. His father was listed as a sawyer.
- June 9: The U.S. Federal Census enumerated in Spencer Twshp., Guernsey County, OH showed eighteen year old William living with his parents and siblings. He, his older brother, John, and his father were all listed as "farm laborers."

1862 August 6: Bracken and his brother John enlisted in the U.S. Army. They were

January 10: Just five months after they joined the army John Bracken died of Rubella in Nashville. He was being treated in U.S. Gen Hosp #14. U.S. Soldiers that died in Nashville were buried in local cemeteries and later removed to the Nashville National Cemetery.

February 28: Appointed Corporal.

March 29: A comrade from the 97th wrote a letter home. It gives a good understanding of the 97th's activity and soldier morale.

We are under marching orders now. There was a Brigade of our men who went out on a scont a few days ago, and the word came in to-day, that they were in contact with the rebel cavalry, and if they did not get reinforcements soon, they would have to surrender to the rebels, and old Rosy sent out two more Brigades and a lot of cavalry to assist them. We was ordered to prepare three days rations and be ready to move at a momenta *arning, but we have not been called out yet, and I hope we will not be for a while. This war is a terrible thing, but the Union soldiers are all united and are determined to put down this rebellion, let it cost what it may, and hope that it may be the motto of the people at home to put down the rebellion at all haze zards. There is a great deal of talk about the traitors of the North, but I hope and pray that the Democracy of Ohio won't disgrace the Democrats who are in the army so much as to rebel against them, and against their homes One half of this army are Democrata and will fight till the last man is killed before they will give up to the rebels. The majority of our best Generals are Democrats. General Bosy himself is a Democrat. We hope the reports are not true, and that our friends in the North think too much of their homes and families to arn tory to them. If they will turn out like men and shoulder a musket, we can soon felca inis rebellion to a close, and then they may be bonored by generations to come, but if they resist, it will be a disgrace to them the longest day they live.

The best and only way that I can see is to turn out and whip the robels till they are gird to yield to our government. To talk of a compromise is nonsense, unless the robe s will give up at reasonable terms, then it might do, but they wont do that. I will have to close as it is late.
