Gabriel Winder McGavock 1845-1860

- 1845 Gabriel was born in Louisiana to Bill and Henny. Bill¹ and Henny were enslaved people owned by Van Perkins Winder.
- 1853 Van Winder visited his daughter's family at Carnton and he brought with him as a gift thirteen-year-old Mary Ellen and eight-year-old Gabriel. Both children were separated from their parents at this time.
- 1860 May 23: Gabriel was injured while riding on a mule sideways. He was badly injured and died within a few hours.

May 24: The Western Review in Franklin reported "Negro Killed–Yesterday evening a negro belonging to Col. John McGavock², while carelessly riding sideways on a mule, slipped and became entangled in the harness, when the mule became frightened injured the negro that he died in about four hours after."

The 1860 Mortality Schedule of the US Census listed two slaves at Carnton died within the previous year, Gabe, thrown by a horse and an unnamed female infant who was smothered.
